Family - Marital Status and Spouses

Marital Status means the status of being married, single, widowed, divorced or separated and includes the status of living with a person in a conjugal relationship outside marriage. What is family status? Family Status is defined as being "in a parent and child relationship." This phrase is understood to mean a parent and child "type" of relationship, involving care, responsibility and commitment, not limited to just parent/child by blood or adoption. Family and marital status are protected in all the areas protected under the Act, which are: statements, publications, notices, signs, symbols, emblems or other representations that are published, issued or displayed before the public. goods, services, accommodation or facilities customarily available to the public. tenancy. employment practices.

Family Code Section 2337. For example, it would be discriminatory for an employer, landlord or service provider to treat a person negatively because of that person's family or marital status, or because of their relationship to their spouse or another family member.

Marital and parental status discrimination, also called familial status discrimination, is discrimination in the workplace based on whether an employee is married or single, or whether they have children or not. Employers may discriminate based on marital or parental status when they deny employment or promotions, harass, pay less, or otherwise take negative employment action against an employee because of the employee's status as a parent, or as a single or married person.

Some examples of reasonable accommodation of marital and family status are (these examples are not exhaustive): a. offering alternative or flexible shift schedules or working arrangements to allow an individual leave from work to provide caregiving duties to children, or to an ill or aged spouse, partner or family member; and

Family and marital status. The Code includes two grounds that provide protections for persons in relationships: marital status and family status. "Marital status" is defined in section 10 of the Code as "the status of being married, single, widowed, divorced or separated and includes the status of living with a person in a conjugal relationship outside marriage", including both same-sex and opposite sex relationships.

In Section 13 of the Human Rights Code, family status has long been included as one of the prohibited grounds for discrimination in employment. The term family status is not defined in the Code, but encompasses one's status as parent or child, among other relationships.

Accommodating Employees' "Family Status": A Legal ...

Marital status is one of the basic issues involved in a lawsuit for divorce (marital dissolution) or an annulment (nullity). At the end of a marital dissolution or nullity proceeding, the legal status of husband and wife is terminated and the spouses are returned to the legal status of being unmarried or single persons.

As its name suggests, marital status discrimination is workplace discrimination that is based on an employee's marital status. It can occur whether you are married or single. Like parental status discrimination, it's a form of familial status discrimination.

Difference between Unmarried and Single in Marital Status ...

De facto marital status can be defined as the status of each individual in terms of his or her living arrangements within the family or household, regardless of that person's legal marital status. Persons who have the family status of 'partner' may also be seen as having the de facto marital status of 'living with a spouse or partner'.

However, in each province and federally, human rights legislation prohibits discrimination on the basis of the protected ground of family status. The Alberta Human Rights Act defines "family status" as the "status of being related to another person by blood, marriage or adoption".
