Listening without judgment an important component of pain ...

Marks (1999) suggests nurses choose to see only perceived physical symptoms of pain, when listening to individuals should be an option. Nurses need to know about the various assessment strategies to make an informed care choice. They need to be aware of how their own attitudes may inhibit their understanding of another individual's experience.

Pain management specialists prescribe medications, perform procedures (such as spinal injections and nerve blocks) and recommend therapies to treat pain. This test is done having your patient lie prone on their stomach. Next, flex the leg at the knee while holding the base of the leg under the knee. Next, simply lift the whole leg up.
