Preparing for the Drug Dosage Calculation Competency Exam ...

$\text{infusion time (hr)} = \frac{\text{total volume (mL)}}{\text{flow rate (mL/hr)}}$
 $\text{total volume (mL)} = \text{flow rate (mL/hr)} \times \text{infusion time (hr)}$
For example, if you must administer 1 L (1,000 mL) of fluid over 4 hours, use the first formula to calculate the flow rate,

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like so: flow rate (mL/hr) = total volume (mL) ÷ infusion time (hr)

To make things easier to set the rate we carry out a simple calculation. The infusion volume is multiplied by the drip factor for the giving set (total number of drops per ml) and divided by the number of minutes (hours x 60) Example. A patient is prescribed 500ml IV 5% Dextrose to be given over 12 hours.
