Vygotsky scaffolding is part of the education concept "zone of proximal development" or ZPD. The ZPD is the set of skills or knowledge a student can't do on her own but can do with the help or guidance of someone else. It's the skill level just above where the student currently is. ZPD is often depicted as a series

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of concentric circles.

However, it is important to note that Vygotsky never used this term in his writing, and it was introduced by Wood, Bruner and Ross (1976). Scaffolding consists of the activities provided by the educator, or more competent peer, to support the student as he or she is led through the zone of proximal development.
