Pazyric carpet dating back to the Achaemenid period. The first documented evidence on the existence of Persian carpets came from Chinese texts dating back to the Sassanid period (224 - 641 CE).

History of Oriental Rugs goes back to the glacial vastness of Siberia's wasteland, when a team of Russian archaeologists in 1949 discovered a unique treasure. Working 5,000 feet above sea level in the Pazyryk Valley of the Altai Mountains, they found the solidly frozen tomb of a Scythian chieftain who died about 300 years before the birth of Christ.

The pile was traditionally made from wool, but since the 20th century, synthetic fibers such as polypropylene, nylon or polyester are often used, as these fibers are less expensive than wool. The pile usually consists of twisted tufts that are typically heat-treated to maintain their structure.
